This will be monitored by faculty or staff.</p> <p>Potentially symptomatic students will be isolated following guidance outlined in 1i.</p> <p>Staff in close contact with someone who is symptomatic must wear a medical-grade face mask. If a student or staff member requires an accommodation, Blanchet will work to limit the proximity to others to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure. <p>Visitors/Volunteers</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Visitors/Volunteers will be unable to work in schools, or complete other volunteer activities that require in person interaction, at this time. Sanitization

- Cleaning and wiping of all surfaces, including door knobs and desk tops will occur between cohort multiple student uses even in the same cohort, and touchpoints will be sanitized with disinfectant by staff wearing gloves at least twice a day.
- Teachers moving between cohorts will wash/sanitize hands between cohorts, keeping a calendar/log of locations.

Students who interact with other cohorts will not interact with more than a total of 100 people within an educational week. ● Students will eat lunch with grade level cohorts while sitting a minimum of 6-feet apart at all times. Cohorts will be located in common areas that have enough space to keep 35sq ft. Students will wash/sanitize hands before and after meals. ● Logs will be kept ensuring that the 6-foot distancing was maintained throughout and cohorts are consistent. <p>Transportation Cohort</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Our two buses will have consistent cohorts in the morning and afternoon. Students will wear masks and keep a minimum of 3 ft apart and 6ft when applicable. <p>Elective</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● When students move stable cohorts there will be an update to the contact tracing log.

More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available from CDC. ● In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students should be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. This can be done visually and/or with confirmation from a parent/caregiver/guardian. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated (see section 1i of the Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance) and sent home as soon as possible. ● They must remain home until 72 hours after fever is gone (without use of fever reducing medicine) and other symptoms are improving. ☒ Follow LPHA advice on restricting from school any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19 within the preceding 14 calendar days. ☒ Staff or students with a chronic or baseline cough that has worsened or is not well-controlled with medication should be excluded from school. Do not exclude staff or students who have other symptoms that are chronic or baseline symptoms (e.g., asthma, allergies, etc.) from school. 	<p>Arrival and Screening</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Each student will be assigned an entrance point (i.e., a specific door) to the school building. ● Staff will be present at each entry point to confirm students have digitally checked in. Digitally checking-in includes a temporal scan by hands free machine scanners for their temperature which is logged in our system (monitored by faculty or staff), they will also answer the questions associated in contact tracing. Staff will also visually screen students prior to entering the building. ● Staff/teachers will visually screen students throughout the day. ● Communication and education will be conducted with families to stress the importance of screening at home (parents/staff will be given a specific list of signs/symptoms to look for and take temperature at home prior to coming to school), and inform staff, students/parents/ to stay home if they are sick, exhibiting symptoms, or have been exposed to COVID-19. ● Staff members are required to self-screen and take their temperatures. They are not responsible for screening other staff. ● Asymptomatic staff and students are required to report when they may have been exposed to a positive Covid-19 case. They may not return to work until 14 days after the last exposure, regardless of test result. A record of the date

☒ Hand hygiene on entry to school every day: wash with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

the school became aware and excluded the individual will be taken. See below if symptoms develop. Local public health authorities will be notified.

- Students/staff members who have NEW symptoms suggestive of Covid-19, such as a fever higher of 100.4 or greater, cough, difficulty breathing, chills, and no fever for 72 hours without fever reducing medications are to be isolated (see 1i) if at school and sent home. They may return after improvement in symptoms AND after a negative COVID test or after 10 days if not tested. If the ill person has not been tested and has a clear alternative diagnosis identified by a health care provider and is fever free for 72 hours (without fever reducing medications), they will need a healthcare provider note in addition to collaboration with local public health authorities prior to returning to school prior to 10 days. They will be encouraged to seek testing through a healthcare provider or the closest testing location. A log of the symptoms reported or observed and if 6 feet was consistently maintained with others, and the date the school became aware and excluded the individual will be made. A school official will contact Marion county public health to verify the case and to begin collaboration contact tracing.
- Staff members are required to self-screen and take their temperatures.
- Staff and students will be educated regarding good hygiene, handwashing, respiratory etiquette, and avoiding public settings while ill.
- When the screening indicates that a student may be symptomatic, the student is directed to the isolation area. (see section 1i).
- Signage of COVID-19 symptoms will be posted
- Hand Sanitation stations have been placed at each entry point. Staff and students required to wash/sanitize hands prior to entry to the school (hand washing vigorously with soap and water for 20 seconds preferred, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol). Any visibly dirty hands are to be washed with soap and water.

- Staff and students will be educated regarding handwashing, and respiratory etiquette.
- They will go directly to their first cohort.

Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.

Involve school nurses, School Based Health Centers, or staff with related experience (Occupational or Physical Therapists) in development of protocols and assessment of symptoms (where staffing exists).

If a student requires transportation from school to home or a caregiver due to symptoms of illness, schools will contact in order 1) the student's parents or caregiver; or 2) emergency contacts.

If the student's symptoms appear to require urgent medical attention and the school is unable to reach the student's parents or caregivers, the school may call an ambulance for transportation to a healthcare facility.

Signage will be posed to warn others of the contaminated area until it is cleaned and sanitized after the sick person leaves.

Persons exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms should go home and seek testing/treatment from their local physician.

If they have a positive COVID-19 viral test, regardless of whether they are symptomatic or asymptomatic they should isolate under the direction of local public health guidance. They should remain home for at least 10 days after illness onset and 24 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and other symptoms improving.

- If they have a negative COVID-19 test (and if they have multiple tests, all tests are negative), they should remain home until 24 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and other symptoms improving.

This is an existing policy previously used in the online setting. As such, there should not be any need to reprogram student information systems to accommodate for this change and the addition of the hybrid setting.

- Note: Because the students in the online and/or hybrid setting do not regularly attend classes at the district facilities, the standard procedures for recording student days present and days absent cannot be effectively applied to those students. This will reduce accuracy of attendance data for the state while this is in effect.
