We were gearing up for an April track dedication social and special Founder's Day celebration focused on our 25th anniversary when the COVID-19 pandemic forced our school to close for the rest of the year. We immediately moved our operations and instruction to a digitalonly platform and our students never missed a day of instruction. Through the hard work of our entire Blanchet community, and always by Courage and Faith, we have been able to continue our mission of educating the whole student and celebrating all that has made Blanchet Catholic School much more than just a building, but a community of people whose mission is as strong today as it was back in 1995. As with any successful venture, Blanchet owes a debt of gratitude for the hard work and foresight of its founding Board members, parents and of course, the students, who for 25 years have blessed and enriched the communities they live in. The following are excerpts from interviews with some of Blanchet's biggest Cav fans as they look back on the last 25 years.





BLANCHET CATHOLIC SCHOOL'S 25TH ANNIVERSARY Looking Back and Moving Forward with Courage & Faith

Blanchet Catholic School's 25th anniversary year has been full of blessings and unpredictable twists and turns. We began our commemorations with a whole-school Mass and pilgrimage to the gravesite of our school's namesake, Archbishop Francois Norbert Blanchet's, located at St. Paul Catholic Church. In October, attendees of our annual True Blue Gala auction were treated to a "memory walk" photo collage from each school year since 1995. Many faculty, alumni and founding Board members had a good time discussing those early days of take-out lunches, the legendary orange carpet in the gym, and how much hair Mr. Andreas once had. Also in October we hosted our first home football game, Homecoming 2019, on our new multipurpose field, complete with a record number in attendance for an alumni social, community barbecue and a Cavs win!

FAITH IN THE MISSION:

Those who have been involved in the Blanchet community for any time know of the February 3, 1994 preliminary meeting at St. Joseph's School, presided over by Mr. Kevin Mannix, to assess interest in reestablishing a Catholic secondary school since the closing of Sacred Heart in 1984. Paul Connolly, Donna Garaventa, Mary Hollinger and Lorraine Anglemier, who did not even have a child yet, were among those in attendance. Each of them were hopeful yet skeptical that there would be enough interest to actually get the project going, but they wanted to show their support. Mrs. Garaventa felt that if anyone were to get this done, it was Kevin Mannix. While Mr. Mannix expected only 30 or so people to show up, an astounding 160 interested community members attended. Thus began Blanchet Catholic School's mission.

When asked what drew them to this new and uncertain venture, each respondent enthusiastically agreed it was the desire to have a quality, Catholic, college-preparatory education in the Willamette Valley for their children and future generations. Mr. Connolly was part of the steering committee to help put into place all of the seemingly endless elements that needed to happen before the school could accept any students. He compared this project to a marathon, but acknowledges that "every decision the Board made was a unanimous one, and every step in the process had a lot of support from the local community, parish pastors, realtors, lawyers and construction workers, many of whom willingly donated their time and expertise."

After much preparation, Blanchet opened its doors on September 5, 1995 with 134 students in grades 7-9. The first graduation was held in June, 1999 for a class of 17 students. In the midst of a pandemic and global shut-down, Blanchet honored its twenty-second graduating class of 45 students this summer.

MISSION STATEMENT

Blanchet Catholic School provides a comprehensive education program that enables students to:

- Be challenged by an academically rigorous curriculum,
- Grow toward maturity in Christ,
- Contribute to the enrichment of society, and
- Participate in the traditions of the Catholic Church.











The first class graduated from Blanchet. The Chapel of Saint Patrick was refurbished and Weathers Softball Field was completed.

Improvements to Blanchet's campus included completion of the baseball field and new gym lights and roof. Blanchet added a new sign on Market Street welcoming visitors to the campus. The first annual Almond Roca candy fundraiser began.





Blanchet received full accreditation from NW Association of Schools & Colleges. The gym was renovated with new hardwood floors, scoreboards, and bleachers. The soccer field was completed and a blue bus donated to the school.



FAITH IN THE **PEOPLE:**

A common theme each interviewee stressed is that we stand on the shoulders of those early benefactors, faculty, staff and students who donated countless hours and resources and achieved much success without many resources to start Blanchet and keep it thriving for these last 25 years. Kevin Mannix and the steering committee tackled the monumental task of finding a space and procuring resources, including 6,000 donated books to stock the Ritter Library. Mrs. Garaventa credits Blanchet's engaged and cohesive Board with working through many transitions such as improving a building that was fast declining and turning it into a quality facility and "capitalizing on the strength and interests of the students to develop co-curricular programs" in areas such as Fine Arts, and most recently, in technology through the expertise of Board member Ms Krishna Namburi.

All unanimously agreed one important blessing was hiring Guido Caldarazzo, Blanchet's first President/ Principal. Through his leadership and expertise as a prior administrator in the Salem Keizer School District, he was able to put the first educational

programs and staff into place. Mr. Connolly fondly recalls that Guido could "draw on school district experts to capitalize the school with various gifts and services." The additions of Chuck Lee/President and Bob Weber/Principal and the dedicated funds from the Blanchet Partners LLC led by Jim Kreitzberg, Larry Epping and Dick Faith gave Blanchet the long-term leadership and financial support it needed to purchase and improve the facility and continue to attract quality faculty and staff to meet the needs of its growing student body, which reached 400 students by 2009.

As Blanchet's first employee, Mrs. Hollinger has a treasure trove of interesting and funny stories regarding those inauspicious early years. From making peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for lunches to teachers only receiving a half a box of staples, Mrs. Hollinger recounts that money was tight, but there "was a real feel of teamwork and pulling together." Mr. Miller, another first-year employee, remembers people who stepped up in various ways to help any way they could; from Larry Tokarski and Rich Kansky with their many contacts, to Doug Weathers who "either had it or knew how to get it."

One of the accomplishments Mr. Miller is most proud of from those early days is getting rid of the "urban forest" of cottonwoods and debris to clear way for the fields in the back of the property.

This 25-year celebration is about Blanchet's accomplished and diverse student body. Those who took a chance on this new venture and enrolled in Blanchet's early years are owed a special nod of appreciation. Mr. Miller noted early on "how impressive our kids were with so little. These happy and fun kids turned into great adults." Two of Blanchet's first enrolled students and 1999 graduates, Ms. Heather Dowen and Ms. Jennifer Trapse, recount how in the first few years they knew they didn't have the best of everything in the aging facility, but they knew they were part of something special.

Ms. Trapse laughed when discussing the looks on the faces of the visiting teams when they came to play basketball on the orange carpet—she remembers the rug burns, too! She also remembers the disappointment of not having enough numbers to have all of the girls' sports right away. Ms. Dowen knew Blanchet was just a start-up and was also frustrated about the lack of sports, but she remembers enjoying subjects that were normally not her favorite, such as math when Mr. Lantis

Now as parents, they had no doubts about sending their children to Blanchet and feel proud to see the growth that has occurred, minus the relaxed dress code, and they are grateful many of the teachers they had like Mrs. Pearson, Mr. Roberts and Mrs. Angove are still there for their children. Mrs. Garaventa echoes this sentiment saving that one of the attributes that makes Blanchet so special is that the teachers really care; that "kids who didn't even know they have talent in a certain area blossom."

Blanchet is thankful to all the people who have dedicated countless prayers, thousands of volunteer hours and millions of dollars to keep our students engaged and prepared for their futures. As Mr. Miller so aptly says, "So many have helped while they are here, and all leave a lasting legacy." When asked what keeps her still connected to Blanchet after 25 years, Mrs. Anglemier says what is most likely true for many who become a part of the Blanchet community, "I'm still here! I don't need to do these things, but I'm called to the mission. It was providential."

When asked what the secret to Blanchet's success is, like a true Cavalier fan, Mr. Miller enthusiastically responds, "By Courage and Faith!"

Even though we are only going 2.5 - 3 mph for 10 hours a day, we are constantly monitoring how the machine sounds and smells, calculating when to unload, and navigating the field without hitting irrigation risers or other obstructions all while making sure we don't spill any seed and pick up every strand of grass along the way. Sometimes it can be stressful but there is a great sense of accomplishment when you complete a field."

Future plans: Katelyn has plans to pursue a college education in the fields of Business and Agriculture at OSU and Tyler is not sure yet what his future career plans are.
