Blanchet Catholic School is very blessed to have Robbe Ostby as a member of its faculty. Mrs. Ostby took over the sixth grade program this fall when former sixth grade teacher Ms. Razmus returned to her role as a Blanchet math teacher.

Mrs. Ostby was born in Naples, Italy. Because her father was a member of the United States Navy and later employed by the federal government, her family moved often. Mrs. Ostby has lived in California, Guam, Hawaii, Oregon, Washington and Virginia. During high school Mrs. Ostby played soccer and field hockey, and was active with Young Life.

After graduating from high school, Mrs. Ostby attended Eastern Washington University where she earned a bachelor of arts in radio and television. She earned her teaching certification at Seattle

Pacific University and a Masters in Education at National Louis University in Heidelberg, Germany.

Her work experiences include three years at a bank in Germany, three years as the national manager for the Signal Corps Regimental Association and a number of years as a substitute teacher. Just prior to joining the Blanchet faculty, Mrs. Ostby taught fifth and sixth grade at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic School in Salem for four years.

Mrs. Ostby enjoys reading, watching movies, watching her daughters play sports and traveling. Her favorite recent vacation was to Scotland, and her dream is to take a safari in Africa.

When asked what her impressions of the Blanchet community are, Mrs. Ostby replies, "When I first came to live in Salem, I visited Blanchet to see if I would be interested in sending my children when they were old enough. I was impressed with the faculty I met and the mission of the school to help students grow in courage and faith. Eventually my oldest daughter started attending Blanchet. The more involved I became as a parent, the more I realized that I wanted to be able to join the Blanchet community as an educator. Now that I am on staff, I know that this is where I belong."

Principal Tony Guevara comments, "Mrs. Ostby has been a wonderful addition to our faculty and a real gift to our middle school students. Her sixth grade classroom is alive with learning and discovery while her seventh grade language arts classes are a safe and engaging environment for budding authors. Mrs. Ostby's caring, supportive, and patient way with her students encourages their highest participation and best efforts. We are fortunate to count her among our teachers!"



SIXTH GRADERS TO ATTEND OUTDOOR SCHOOL

Mrs. Ostby is very pleased to announce that this fall the sixth grade will be attending outdoor science school at Camp Westwind on the Oregon Coast. The curriculum offered during camp is tied to Oregon State Education Standards, and the students' natural inclination to explore, combined with guidance from qualified educators, will result in an outstanding educational experience. In the natural laboratory at outdoor science school, the study of ecology, science, math and conservation of natural resources takes on real meaning. Through hands-on activities, students develop an appreciation of the natural world and their place in it. At the same time, social growth occurs as the students learn, live and play together.

Westwind is located on the Oregon coast, just a few miles north of Lincoln City. In use by Northwest Outdoor Science School since 1984, Westwind is one of the most beautiful places in Oregon. Its 508 acres of wild coastal land include two miles of coastline, rocky headlands and sea caves, mature Sitka spruce and beach pine forests, and the Salmon River estuary. Westwind and Cascade Head (pictured above) are part of a U.N. Biosphere Reserve

Westwind is an outstanding place to study natural science. Its seclusion -- access is only by boat across the Salmon River, or a three mile hike along an access road -- and inclusion within the Cascade Head Scenic-Research Area have kept it a very wild place. Wildlife at Westwind include bald eagles, elk, ravens, deer, sea lions, salmon, bobcats and whales. Also, there are numerous tide pools and sea caves filled with wondrous marine organisms.

# P.E.O. CHAPTER ET SCHOLARSHIP

## Women Helping Women Reach for the Stars

Ten Blanchet Catholic graduates have received financial support to attend college through the assistance of the P.E.O. Chapter ET Scholarship program.

P.E.O. is a philanthropic organization where women celebrate the advancement of women, educate women through scholarships and awards, and motivate women to achieve their highest aspirations.

The local chapter has been providing scholarships annually to graduating Blanchet seniors since 2007. Education Committee member Pam Morris explains that the scholarships are memorials that pay tribute to a chapter member who has passed away. Scholarship recipients receive information about the deceased club member when they are notified of the award.

Local P.E.O. scholarship amounts vary each year. The chapter helps the Blanchet recipients apply for state P.E.O scholarships. College Counselor Nancy Parks annually recommends four senior girls to the P.E.O. Salem chapter Education Committee, who review their applications and conduct an interview with each of the nominees.

According to Ms. Morris, the primary consideration for a P.E.O. Chapter ET Scholarship is financial need. The unique aspect of this program is that the P.E.O. chapter informally "adopts" the Blanchet students. In addition to financial support towards college, members provide phone calls, letters, birthday cards, Christmas gifts, and more. They want to ensure that their scholarship recipients are successful in college and beyond, and to this end members provide a lot of nurturing and assistance. This might involve giving pep talks, visiting them at college, helping them navigate life on a college campus, and more. Close relationships develop, and the group stays in contact with many of the Blanchet scholarship recipients. Ms. Morris notes that her advice to scholarship recipients often is to"concentrate and devote energies on what you need to do during college."

The P.E.O. Chapter ET currently consists of 46 local women. Their group was established in 1981 in Salem, but the national P.E.O. organization has a long and illustrious history dating back 143 years. The local chapter funds their scholarship through a successful annual sale of packaged nuts in the fall and other fund raising efforts.

Ms. Morris and members of the Chapter ET Education Committee annually present their scholarship at Blanchet's end of the year awards celebration – Class Day. They have greatly enjoyed forming a close relationship with our students and staff. The chapter members note that they are always impressed with "the quality of Blanchet students and their academic achievement. Many students volunteer, participate in a wide variety of experiences and rise above challenging circumstances. Blanchet students often have an idea of what they want to do. Chapter ET's goal is to help them prepare and focus on the future, and complete their college education."

Blanchet alumna Ashley Schlechter was selected to receive a P.E.O. scholarship when she graduated in 2009. "Receiving a scholarship from P.E.O. is so much more than just money towards your education. You also get to build relationships with wonderful ladies in the community who want you to succeed. The P.E.O. and the ladies involved have had such an influence and impact on my college years and education, and I am so thankful for all it has given me," she comments. Ashley recently completed her third year of college at Linfield and first year of nursing school.

# A CONVERSATION WITH LARRY TOKARSKI

Larry Tokarski is a member of Blanchet Catholic's President's Advisory Board. He is a Blanchet grandfather and generous supporter. Mr. Tokarski has been a loyal donor since 1997. He has helped pay off the mortgage on the school facility, build our new Commons building, and sponsors the school's Friends of Benedictine service club, among other projects. He served as the commencement speaker for the class of 2012.

"About fifteen years ago, I remember attending Mass at St. Joseph Church. While I sat in the pew praising God, I told Him if there was anything he wanted me to do, He should show me the way. Shortly after, a parishioner came by and asked me to help with the collection baskets. I immediately said no because this was not something I was comfortable doing.


"After a few seconds, however, I realized that just a few minutes earlier I had told God I would do whatever He wanted. He had sent me a messenger, and I hadn't followed instructions. Embarrassed, I ran down the aisle and began helping.

"That day changed the direction of my life. I vowed God that if He sent people to me asking for help, I would do my best to take care of them.

"That's how I came to be involved in Blanchet Catholic School. I was friends with Phil Settecase, an architect who served on Blanchet's Board of Directors. Phil was a dreamer. He kept talking about Blanchet and I gradually starting listening.

"I'm especially called to help two populations – kids and old people, because they are both constantly being taken advantage of in society. I support kids because some parents aren't doing their jobs and the elderly because society doesn't always see their value.

"I value Blanchet because you have teachers who are passionate – you have the best quality teachers who are there for the right reasons. Also, you have parents who participate which is crucial. Your students take full advantage of the opportunities available, and they appreciate the gift that they are given. I also believe in the structure and discipline that Blanchet provides.



"If families are looking for the best college prep secondary education that's available – there is only one place to be, and that's Blanchet.

"I like to give to specific projects. I'm motivated when leaders approach me with identified needs and I can see where the project is going. I've invested in Blanchet because your leaders have my trust. I know and value what you are doing – it makes it easy to make the decision when you have great stewards.

"I'm looking forward to serving as the class of 2012's commencement speaker. I'm going to share with them some of the mistakes I've made in my life and career, and what I've learned. I will talk about some big themes – namely forgiveness, risk taking and love.

"My advice for the class of 2012 is to choose carefully. As young adults entering college, they should not abandon their true desire. However, what they want to be should be balanced against the economic environment. They should evaluate their interests against reality to prevent disappointment and heartbreak."

# NEWS FROM THE DEVELOPMENT OFFICE



The Heart of the Campus

Blanchet broke ground on April 13 on what President Lee has described as the new "heart of the campus," a 10,600 sq. ft. addition to the school. Located across from the soccer field, the new Commons building will include a cafeteria, kitchen, athletic locker rooms, student store and landscaped courtyard. Designed by Garth Brandaw of CBTwo Architects/Construction and constructed by Jim Tokarski of Phoenix Contracting, the Commons is the largest expansion of the school since 2005 when the Auxiliary Gym was completed. We anticipate that the Commons will be complete by November 2012.

The Commons is the largest project included in the school's "Foundation for the Future" campaign. We are still seeking donors to help fund the remaining goals outlined in the campaign including: providing tuition assistance, upgrading technology, enhancing the curriculum and renovating facilities. We ask for your assistance in raising the last \$600,000 needed to complete

the campaign. Donors of \$1,000 and more will be recognized on a donor wall inside the new Commons.

Honor a Student or Family Member with a Stepping Stone

Our annual fund, "Stepping Stones to Success," is underway. To date, we have raised \$45,000 towards our \$60,000 goal to support students and programs. All annual fund donations are applied to our operating budget, where they support everything from salaries,

transportation, student activities, athletics, and more.

We are offering a special opportunity this spring. Annual fund donors of \$500 and more will receive a custom hexagon shaped stepping stone that will be installed in the courtyard adjacent to the new Commons building. Donors can choose a combination of text and symbols that will be permanently engraved on the stone. *Please make your contribution to the annual fund by June 30*.

# Facility Updates Continue Courtesy of the Epping Family Foundation

The Larry & Jeanette Epping Family Foundation recently awarded Blanchet \$70,000 to be used this summer towards facility renovations. The monies specifically will be used to renovate two mid high restrooms and to purchase \$20,000 worth of flooring for the administrative hallway, offices, a team room and a classroom. The Epping Foundation has been instrumental in helping renovate and modernize the Blanchet campus throughout the school's history, and we are extremely grateful for their support.

# 8TH GRADE CLASS HONORED AS STATE WINNERS OF DISNEY PLANET CHALLENGE

On Tuesday, May 29, Blanchet's 8th grade class was honored during a special all-school assembly. The 8th graders, led by science teacher Mrs. Halsey Randall, were recently named as the state winners of the Disney Planet



Challenge Project for their efforts to improve the Willamette watershed on school grounds and to establish a native plant garden. The group was presented with prizes, and volunteers, donors and partners were recognized during the assembly that was immediately followed by a blessing and dedication ceremony at the garden site on campus.



Disney's Planet Challenge is the in-school program for Disney's Friends for Change, a multi-platform initiative, which focuses on inspiring kids and families around the world to take simple steps to help the planet and their communities.

This year's competition drew thousands of students from across the United States and featured a tremendous variety of projects, including cafeteria composting, the clean-up of local lakes and watershed improvements. Students and teachers spent long hours of classroom and field work to create environmental portfolios, document their

research, implement solutions and engage their local communities.

A panel of scientists, environmental experts and educators, including representatives from the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA) and WestEd K-12 Alliance, selected the finalists and national winner. Blanchet's project took 6th place in the nation.

Mrs. Halsey-Randall and her 8th grade students worked for months on their comprehensive project. They invited guest speakers into their classroom, including leaders from SOLV who inspired them to rehabilitate a stream system that runs through the Blanchet Catholic campus. Students volunteered dozens of hours outside of school to remove invasive species from the streams, such as blackberries and reed canary grass, as well as other debris and garbage. Students attended an all day field trip to the Oregon Garden where they learned more about native plants and participated in a service project. The 8th grade class spread the word about their project and asked for volunteers and donations. They were successful in installing native trees on campus, in addition to creating a native plant demonstration garden.

The group's efforts have been recognized by local foundations, such as the Diack Ecology Education Program, which granted funds for educational supplies to allow the garden to become an outdoor science lab. In addition, three students (Jessica Bosworth, Hannah Chong & Alyssa Walsh) were recently notified that their poems about the watershed will be published in the 2012 "Students Honoring Our Rivers" anthology.

Blanchet President Charles Lee said, "We are very proud of the efforts of Mrs. Halsey Randall and her 8th grade science students. The students' Disney Planet Challenge project was incredibly creative and required ingenuity and hard work. The students have taken the initiative to improve the environment, and in addition to learning a lot about the issues surrounding the Willamette watershed, have made a huge positive impact on our campus and the health of the streams that are located on our grounds."

### MEGAN ANGSTROM ~ OPTIMIST STUDENT OF THE YEAR

Senior Megan Angstrom was honored by the Salem Optimist Club as Optimist Student of the Year.

Megan was honored earlier this year as Optimist Student of the Month – Most Involved in Fine &



Performing Arts. The administration unanimously agreed to honor her as the Optimist Student of the Year for her outstanding contributions to the fine arts (drama and visual art), her academic achievements (3.988 GPA) and her community service. Megan has been involved in the Friends of Benedictine service club for several years and is incredibly kind and patient with the nursing center residents. She received a Friends of Benedictine Excellence Award for her dedication to the club. Megan also completed her senior service project at the Providence Benedictine Nursing Center, which included making plant identification markers for their therapy garden.

# STUDENT FROM TANZANIA

James Kisanga is one of twenty-seven international students who studied at Blanchet Catholic this year – but has the distinction of being the first international student in school history from Africa.

James' home country is Tanzania – an East African country bordered by Kenya and Uganda to the north. The eastern border of Tanzania is the Indian Ocean. James has studied at Blanchet since January of this year, and is gradually adjusting to life and school in America. His goal is to graduate from Blanchet, attend university and become a doctor like his mentor and sponsor, Dr. James Lace.

Dr. Lace is a local pediatrician who has made several mission trips to Tanzania over the years to provide medical care. He met James and his family several years ago, and James often serves as Dr. Lace's interpreter during his visits to Africa.

Dr. Lace says James' mother, Gladness, is very grateful for her son to attend Blanchet. Some Blanchet students may remember meeting Gladness, a Masai woman, whom Dr. Lace brought to the Blanchet campus to speak a few years ago. "For a Tanzania boy to attend school in the U.S. is a huge opportunity," says Dr. Lace. Dr. Lace describes James' hometown, Arusha, as a city of 1/2 million that is culturally diverse and whose inhabitants are exposed to westerners. Even though

MEET JAMES KISANGA ~ INTERNATIONAL James' family enjoys a nice house in Tanzania, many villagers in more rural areas live in mud huts.

> When asked to describe his home, James said what is most distinctive about Tanzania is the warm tropical weather and the wildlife reserves. He enjoys seeing a variety of wildlife on a daily basis, and his favorite animal is the lion! He lives very close to Mt. Kilimanjaro. James began studying English in first grade. At the private school he attended, he was required to learn English and to speak only English at school. As a result, James can speak English very well. At home and with his friends, James usually speaks Swahili.

James has one sister who just completed secondary school and a brother who is in college. His mom works for non-profit organizations and helps with orphanages, and his father works in tourism. While he misses his family very much, he stays in contact through phone calls, email and video chats.



Shawn Lonergan '01 has enjoyed a distinguished career in the military. He recently finished a command that included putting a brigade together for cyber-warfare operational readiness.

Shawn was selected by the Department of Social Sciences at West Point (his alma mater) to attend graduate school this fall. Following completion of graduate school, he will assume an assignment teaching in the International Relations Program at West Point (in 2014). His selection was the result of an extremely competitive process and is indicative of West Point's high regard for his tremendous performance as an officer and exceptional potential for future service.

Shawn was accepted to the Masters programs at Columbia, Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Georgetown and Johns Hopkins. He has accepted the offer to attend Columbia's Ph.D. program in political science beginning in the fall of 2012.

Shawn was also recently honored as a General Douglas MacArthur Award recipient for the United States Army Intelligence and Security Command. This award is given annually to an officer who embodies the ideas of "Duty, Honor, Country" and has made significant contributions to the U.S. Army. Specifically, Shawn was recognized for his accomplishments while serving as a company commander assigned to Fort Meade. His nomination letter for the award noted the following:

"As the Deputy Chief of the Expeditionary Access Operations (EAO), Shawn's leadership and operational savvy earned him the trust and respect of the Division's senior management. As such, he was given charge of the organization's \$14 million operations and training budget and served as the Contracting Officer Representative (COR) for projects focused on acquiring and integrating sensitive collection systems, valued at over \$60 million.

"During his tenure as EAO, Lonergan deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan to observe and certify the operational employment of his collectors. Upon returning, Shawn applied lessons learned to revolutionize the pre-deployment process by changing how teams were trained, organized and employed.


